**INTRODUCTION**

Global security, climate, and economic challenges are increasingly affecting the state of food security worldwide.

Despite the war, Ukraine remains a reliable supplier of food and a guarantor of food solidarity amid geopolitical instability, demonstrates its capacity to supply food where it is most needed.

The Fourth International Summit on Food Security, to be held in Kyiv on 19 November 2025, will serve as a global platform for dialogue and joint action aimed at strengthening solidarity, enhancing resilience, and ensuring food security. Building on the humanitarian initiative “Grain from Ukraine,” the expanded “Food from Ukraine” program reflects Ukraine’s determination to remain a guarantor of global food security despite unprecedented challenges.

Russia’s war, climate shocks, disruptions in logistics, and economic instability have had a serious impact on global food systems. At the same time, Ukraine continues to prove its reliability by supplying food to regions where it is needed most. Since 2022, within the framework of the initiative, over 320,000 tons of food have been delivered to countries in Africa, Asia, and the Middle East, with the support of more than 40 governments and declared contributions exceeding USD 370 million.

The 2025 Summit will mark the next stage – the transition from “Grain from Ukraine” to “Food from Ukraine.” This will ensure predictable financing, early humanitarian procurement, a diversified range of products, an expanded geography of assistance, and integration into the operational framework of the World Food Programme (WFP).

Special attention will be devoted to innovations in agriculture, humanitarian demining of farmlands, and the transformation of Ukraine’s agro-industrial sector into a driver of recovery and sustainable development.

**MAIN COMPONENTS OF THIS YEAR’S EVENT**

**INTERNATIONAL SUMMIT** – A discussion platform for Heads of State and Government, international organizations, and business. Presentation of the new initiative “Food from Ukraine,” mobilization of donor assistance, and promotion of Ukraine’s initiative as a guarantor of global food security.

**AGROEXPO** – Presentation of capacities and products of Ukrainian manufacturers, new technologies, innovative solutions, and scientific developments. Demonstration of Ukraine’s agrarian potential, technologies, start-ups, and integrated business solutions.

**BUSINESS FORUM (BASED ON AGROEXPO)** – Discussion of modern business solutions and presentations of products for contracting and opening potential new markets.
